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A VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE

On An Effective,
Considerate,
Change of Watch

Here it comes! You all knew I'd say something about this sooner or later. Since we're there right now, let it be sooner. Did you ever stop to think how many elected or appointed staff positions change hands every year? Let me guide you through a bit of mental gymnastics to come up with an estimated total: District - 5 elected, 56 appointed; Divisions (13) -26 elected, 169 appointed; Flotillas (101) - 202 elected, 1313 appointed (positions). If you have been adding as you go, you should now have a total of 1771 - and this does not even include the assistants of the Division and Flotilla levels. Nor does it include special project committees such as for changeof-watch dinners, conferences, or other special events. What am I leading up to? Just this, all of these officers maintain custody of one Heck of a lot of records, files, and equipment! Subtracting those positions wherein the incumbent is either reappointed or reelected, I think that I could reasonably assume that at least half of the individuals in these positions are new this year and will be newly assuming custody of these records, files and equipment.

Already, I have heard comments regarding the poor condition of the files and records passed on from one watch to the next. It is extremely important to the effective functioning of this or any organization to have an orderly passing of the watch from one person to the next. One of the significant features of this change of watch is the assumption of custody and responsibility of the records and files for each position. It is downright inconsiderate to pass on a pile of papers and folders which look like a recycling factory. Likewise, it is just as inconsiderate to procrastinate in turning over the files for the various popular reasons - "I want to clean them out", "The totals aren't complete", "I left them at the office", "They're still in the trunk of my car". None of these excuses will wash. Make an appointment with your relief and get the files and records into his/her possession. Be considerate and give the new officer a chance to get started on an even keel and in a timely manner, rather than months behind. For example, if the Flotilla Commander and the SO-OP don't have last year's seminar list, how can they check this year's list when it comes out to determine what names they need to check out with the Director's office?

The fact that you are reading this article probably means that you are one of the many conscientious officers, elective or appointive, who keep your files in good shape and turn them over promptly. Not wanting to "preach to the choir", as it were, to all of you, I say congratulations on a job well done. Please help me to get this message to those who need it.

OK, I've rambled on long enough. You all get the point. Be considerate of your fellow Auxiliarists who are taking on new jobs. Give them a chance for a timely start. Don't be afraid of being criticized if the files are not letter perfect. Frankly, I would be suspicious of the value of letter perfect files. Have a frank and thorough discussion of the pending matters, give a "show and tell" tour through the files and records so that they make some sense to the new officer, and DO IT NOW!

Welcome to the New Year. Best wishes to everyone for a happy, safe and healthy 1981.

By this time all of you know who the elected and staff officers are, and should be busy working towards achieving your goals. Now there is an interesting word, GOALS. Let us take a look at the Director's Goals for 1981.

- a) AUXMIS Reduce errors by 75%, and provide timely information, HELP.
- b) Public Education In 1980 we reached just over 7,000 adults with a Public Education course of one type or another. Yet we taught over 17,000 youths. Are we really getting the best results for our efforts or are we striving to reach a quota? In 1981 I am asking the FSO-PE's to try more three lesson courses and less water and kids.
- c) CME's The Commodore has set a goal of 25,000. If the VE's in this District do 25,000 QUALITY exams, I will be very pleased. Remember the goal of the Marine Examination Program is SAFETY through information, not to see how many decals we can give away.

- d) Operations My goal is to increase the operational facilities by 20 percent, and to increase the number of patrols done under category 03 orders by 15 percent.
- e) Member Training Increase the MT Sessions by 30 percent.

A close look at the above goals will reveal that my strongest efforts will be in the operations and member training areas. I have the money for all of the Category 03 Patrols you want to perform in 3SR waters. Additionally, my staff will work closely with the Commodore to insure every possible effort is made to have an MT Course available to each and every member. Our plan calls for the Commodore's staff to travel to areas, Divisions, and Flotilla's if necessary, to provide instruction for the instructors. Useful aids in lesson plans and how to teach difficult subjects will be taught.

Anyone having an idea on how these goals can be accomplished or what is needed to achieve them is encouraged to drop me a line.

A good number of mistakes are repeated by Auxiliarists who do not know they are filling out the form incorrectly. FCs check your lists of Instructors, Operators, and Courtesy Examiners, is everyone listed? These are important items to check early (the lists are published and

Since joining the Auxiliary 26 October 1956 I have seen many changes take place. Some good, some not so good, and reaction to the changes has varied.

Even though we are a non-military, volunteer organization, we are a civilian component of The United Stated Coast Guard and are obligated to work within the guidelines set forth in our various manuals. What has this got to do with change?

When a change comes down to the Flotilla level from National or District, it invariably affects the Auxiliarist, and the program in which the Auxiliarist is involved, be it PE, VE, OPS or administration of the Flotilla or Division.

- 3. Commission the Flotilla Commander to put the item before the Division Board. If passed by the Division Board, the Division Captain should take it on through channels to become an agenda item at the District Board.



As we reflect on the passing of the previous year we have opportunity to evaluate past jobs well done and to wonder how well the job will be done by those newly appointed or elected.



DSO - GROWTH AND RETENTION

What am I supposed to do?

How many times have we heard this from the FSO-GR? Remember, we in Growth & Retention have no lesson to prepare, boats to examine, patrols to be made. Our job concerns PEOPLE in the Auxiliary - both old members and new not the programs.

How Do We Do Our Job?

Contact those who miss a meeting or those we haven't seen for several months. They may have had a misunderstanding with the leadership or there may be other problems which a friendly talk and concerned attitude can correct, thus retaining a trained person for the Auxiliary.

Follow up all new prospects. Give a proper orientation to the Auxiliary, fully explaining all programs. This is vital as a poor first impression can result in a very short association. Remember, the Auxiliary is NOT for everyone!

Meet all guests and prospective members AT THE DOOR. Make sure to introduce them. Make them feel wanted as members - not just tolerated.

Present the Auxiliary Story to all PE classes. The students are used to the regular instructors, so a new face with a dynamic story will get the attention of the class. The Instructor's job IS TO TEACH. The GR Officer's job IS TO PRESENT MEMBERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES IN THE AUXILIARY.

Contact non-dues paying members. They may have forgotten or perhaps did not get a bill or notice. No member should be dropped because of neglect.

One of the best indicators of the health of a Flotilla is the percentage of members attending the Flotilla meetings and activities compared to the total membership of the Flotilla.

With an effective date of 29 December 1958, Division VII was instituted with EAST CENTRAL, NEW JERSEY as its designated name.

After the original Division I became defunct shortly after World War II, a few new Flotillas were formed and became part of Division II, which, for several years, spread into the vacated territory.

As with several other Divisions, Division VII drew, as a nucleus, some Flotillas from Division II.

Note that, after a Flotilla has been disestablished, the Flotilla Number is usually assigned to a newly established Flotilla at a later date.

Also, as mentioned above, Division VII was established in more or less the same territory as the original Division I, which collapsed, finally, with the disestablishment of Flotilla 12 at Waretown in 1953.

The reason that the Division Number was not reassigned to the area on 29 December 1958 is that the Division I designation had been given to the State of Delaware when it split from Division IV on 1 January 1956.

To further complicate the situation, Division IV was originally assigned to the State of Delaware when the system was set up in the early 1940's.

Keep in mind, - all of this is FREE compared to out brother organization, the United States Power Squadron, which charges up to \$25.00 for each course. A bargain - RIGHT?

Now lets go a bit further into the entire AUXOP program of passing all seven specialty courses. To you members who have already passed several O.S.C. courses, it is an ideal time to sit in on the on going courses you are short and work yourself up to the ultimate goal of becoming an AUXOP member. If each member would encourage his/her SO-MT or FSO-MT to develop one or more training centers I'm sure we would significantly improve the AUXOP programs.


